Awareness on intangible cultural heritage (ICH) does not manifest as easily as tangible heritage. However, ICH is the soul of our heritage, carrying its essence. This is why UNESCO views intangible heritage as the repository of human creativity and cultural diversity. Living heritage is transmitted across generations, but also changes through time, which gives it the characteristic of both tradition and modernity. It holds immense values in the lives of ordinary people. However, due to the unfamiliarity of the concept and its formless nature, it can be difficult to understand its impact on our lives.

Intangible cultural heritage exists closer to us than we think. It adds fun to our daily lives, makes our society worth living in, enhances individual capacities, and adds value to our lives. At this forum, we want to explore how this living heritage enriches and adds value to our lives, and the role it plays in sustainable development and individual capacity-building through the keywords of "enjoyment and participation", "solidarity and respect", and "study and learning" with the help of case studies from specialized institutions in the respective fields.

Through this forum, some of us may discover the beauty of living heritage in our daily lives, and others might even go on to become a guardian of intangible cultural heritage in the future. We also hope that it would be an opportunity for professionals and institutions in the ICH field to further expand their current safeguarding activities.

This session presents ICH activities that help us understand the larger role of living heritage in public life.

Panel Discussion 1: Agency of the Public in ICH Enjoyment: Direction for ICH Promotion Activities and Policy

Overview: Sessions 1 and 2 focus on case studies related to the enjoyment of ICH and
the social value of ICH respectively, connected to the activities of promotional
organizations that initiate participatory activities and policy institutions that build social
infrastructures. The goal of this discussion is to think about the direction of promotional
activities and policy-making to achieve sustainability in civic life.

 Overview: From participant to professional. ICH becomes more than a hobby for some, as it develops into a vocation and means of self-actualization. The knowledge and wisdom contained in ICH also breed insight, raise awareness, and provide a source of income for the individual to realize their full potential in society.

Panel Discussion 2: Agency of the Public in ICH Safeguarding - Direction for ICH Education and Research

Overview: Education increases participation of people with little background in ICH. It
also enhances the expertise of ICH practitioners (heritage managers, cultural experts,
tradition bearers, and so on), helping them grow as protectors of ICH and fostering
more active safeguarding activities. ICH practitioners also perform research to make
recommendations for policy and provide data that inform the activities of other actors.
This discussion explores the direction for ICH education and research activities that
transform the public into more active agents of safeguarding.

Special Session 1 : ICH Safeguarding in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) and International Cooperation

Overview: The DPRK has been party to the Convention since 2008. Three ICH
elements of the country namely Arirang, kimchi making, and ssireum (traditional
wrestling) are inscribed into the Representative List. The DPRK has updated local
laws to create the institutional foundation for ICH safeguarding. This session explores
safeguarding activities within the DPRK and international cooperation in the field
through UNESCO.

Special Session 2: Inter-Korean Cooperation for Joint Safeguarding of ICH in the Korean Peninsula

Overview: The two Koreas are one nation, which share a common cultural heritage.
 They have been making their respective efforts in various ways to safeguard ICH. Last December, ssireum wrestling was jointly inscribed into the Representative List by the two Koreas in Mauritius, marking a new turning point in the inter-Korean relationship. This session provides discussions on ways for joint safeguarding efforts between the two Koreas for peace and reconciliation in the Korean peninsula.
